If there is a silver lining in all of this ugliness, it's that it's never been easier for the church to fulfill her mandate to be “a holy nation, a peculiar people” (1 Peter 2:9). In a world of darkness, the church must be a beacon of light.

Obviously, it's not easy to put others first because it's not natural. Self-centeredness is our default setting. But we've got to be different. In his letter to the Ephesians, Paul tells Christ followers to “put off falsehood” and “let no unwholesome talk come out of your mouths” and “get rid of anger.” So even if it's not easy, we are still commanded to do it.

This is where the church comes in. We are a community of cheerleaders. We celebrate one another's victories, no matter how insignificant. We embrace brokenness and resist arrogance. We cultivate a culture of support and acceptance. It's not only healthy, it's fun.
